Our school was well represented by Year 9 students Lachlan Devlin and Justin Walsh and Year 11 student Tayah Turnbull. We would also like to thank Mr Greenwood for the mentoring and support prior to the trip and escorting the students to Melbourne and to Mr Chris Tan for allowing our students to participate and experience this opportunity.

At the beginning of this term Narromine High hosted a **Year 6 into 7 evening** for parents and carers and **Year 10 into 11 subject selection and information evening**. Both evenings gave all involved relevant information about programs and school structures for 2020. In particular, the information relating to the HSC course gave students, parents and carers the opportunity to receive relevant information relating to NESA course requirements. # ENGLISH, HISTORY, READING & NETBALL WITH MISS A 4.4 (7 & 8) English



4.4 Students have just completed an assessment on 'Displaced People'. The students conducted research around the myths and facts of refugees, how many refugees are located in Australia and where the largest refugee camp is in the world.

Don't forget students can jump onto Literacy Planet at home to improve their literacy skills.

#### 5.1 (9 & 10) English

Currently 5.1 students are working through the program 'Australia's Voice in the World' where students look at famous speeches, their importance to our nation and the impacts. They are also encouraged to explore notions of Australian identity within the global context. They will also consider current issues in Australia. The assessment for this topic is a two minute speech. The speech can be recorded, presented in front of the class or a small selection of class members.

#### **Assessment Task:**

- a) Choose a significant day of celebration/event for all Australians (eg. Anzac Day; Australia Day; NAIDOC day; etc.). Present the official speech for the day, expressing its importance and your vision for all Australians on the day.
- b) Prepare a speech about an important issue in Australia today. In your speech, give your considered opinion about the issue, why you think it's important for Australia and what you believe should/should not be done.
- c) You are giving the Welcome speech to a group of newly declared Australian citizens from a range of backgrounds. What do you tell them about what is important to Australians and their role in Australian society?

#### 11 English Studies

Year 11 English studies are wrapping up their final topic for Year 11. They have submitted a portfolio task and will need to keep these items as they progress into Year 12. In term 4 they will start the HSC course, commencing with Texts and Human Experiences.





#### HSC minimum standard - from 2020

Students need to meet the HSC minimum standard to receive the HSC. To show they meet the standard students need to:

- achieve Level 3 or 4 in the online reading test and
- achieve Level 3 or 4 in the online writing test and
- achieve Level 3 or 4 in the online numeracy test.

This level of achievement will also be expected by TAFE as a minimum.



We are preparing students in Years 10 and 11 for these tests over the next few weeks. Students will sit the online tests TWICE in Term 4 in an effort to achieve the standard prior to the HSC or leaving school. #### YEARS 7 & 8 PHOTOGRAPHY PROGRAM - "THROUGH OUR EYES"




